Oh my, please go, even if it's just to try out the fried chicken. All the food is inspired by New Orlean specialties. French, Spanish and Southern American combinations. But if it's looking thin, don't fret. It's a short rotating menu. Expect new tastes on the regular.



The Drink; Avoiding the big names, NOLA focuses on sourcing its tap beer from local independent craft brewers. Sourced from Australia and all over the world, expect your finest small batch whiskey makers.
